Dear Rising 6th grader,

Congratulations on completing your 5th grade year! I hope your summer is filled with safe fun and excitement. While you are vacationing, or enjoying a nice day at the beach, I want you to remember the value of a good book. Reading should not be considered homework. It is a life skill that everyone needs to cultivate in order to live a successful life.

Because Blessed Sacrament School has high expectations for students' literacy development, we have prepared a summer reading list and summer reading assignment for all middle schoolers. All students must complete the summer reading activities before the second week of 6th grade. Assignments are due on Tuesday, September 5, 2017 and will count for a grade in Language Arts.

ASSIGNMENT

Step 1: Choose **2** books from the summer reading list that you intend to read.

Step 2: As you read **each** book, keep a journal of your predictions, connections, and reflections about the story and characters. Include quotes from the books to support your entries. You should have at least 10 entries for each book and each entry should be at least a half page in length.

Step 3: Choose **1** of the two books you read and create an illustrated book cover for the novel. Include a summary of the story that describes the main character and the central conflict. Please use printer paper and NOT lined paper.

loose leaf paper (This is needed for ALL subjects, so several packages will be needed over the course of the school year.)

pens (blue or black), pencils, erasers, highlighters

1 simple calculator with a square root function

1 small package of graph paper or a graph paper notebook (not a composition style notebook)

3 folders with pockets (for Friday folder, homework, and work in progress/school work)

2 large boxes of facial tissues

1 container of disinfectant wipes

1 USB flash drive

1 pencil sharpener

ear buds for computer use
